Tu Appreciative - 2 Timothy 2:2-7

We Leading - 2 Timothy 2:2-7

Th Opportunity - 2 Timothy 2:2-7

Fr New - 2 Timothy 2:2-7, Matthew 25:25

The fear of NEW can be paralyzing. Today, connect with both a spiritual leader and directly with God to share any fears you might have. Ask for training and assistance in faithfully moving forward.

Sa Energy - 2 Timothy 2:2-7

Hardships often prepare ordinary people for an extraordinary destiny. God's history then and God's people now can help you navigate around energy-depleting pitfalls. Use that energy saved to bless many others.

- Utilizing talent requires two key components: a desire to learn and a desire to do. It's been said that everyone is a salesperson because they must sell what they are doing in life. Matt says, "everyone can be a leader and learner." In what ways are you a leader? How will being a lifelong learner enhance your leadership?
- Leading and learning require relationships. Read 2 Timothy 2:2. In what area of your life do you see this trend of learning and leading repeating to others?
 - Within our congregation, who do you appreciate for walking with you, leading, and helping you?
 - Who do you see who needs someone to walk with them, to learn from?
- Matthew 25:14-30 is a fascinating story. We miss most of the interaction between the master and his workers. We must infer the previous conversations and expectations of the master to the workers based on the lazy worker's response, "I knew you were a hard man, harvesting where you had not planted... I was afraid." When speaking about your spiritual talent(s), what level of fear governs your action or lack of action?
- Our culture often gripes, "Good work is rewarded with more work." Is this what Jesus is teaching when He says, Whoever has will be given more..."? (Matt 25:29)
- In the sermon, Matt shared the idea that we should never walk alone. Spiritually, do you feel you are walking alone? Who could you partner with to learn from? Who could you partner with to lead and help?
