uring a British conference on comparative religions, experts worldwide debated what, if any, belief was unique to the Christian faith. They began eliminating possibilities. Incarnation? Other religions had different versions of gods appearing in human form. Resurrection? Again, other religions had accounts of return from death.

The debate went on for some time until C. S. Lewis wandered into the room. "What's the rumpus about?" he asked and heard in reply that his colleagues were discussing Christianity's unique contribution among world religions. Lewis responded, "Oh, that's easy. It's grace." After some discussion, the conferees had to agree.

Author Philip Yancey adds, "The notion of God's love coming to us free of charge, no strings attached, seems to go against every instinct of humanity. The Buddhist eightfold path, the Hindu doctrine of Karma, the Jewish covenant, and the Muslim code of law — each offers a way to earn approval. Only Christianity dares to make God's love unconditional."

Max Lucado highlights the power of grace this way, "Ponder the achievements of God. He doesn't condone our sins, nor does he compromise his standard. He doesn't ignore our rebellion, nor does he relax his demands. Rather than dismiss our sins, he assumes our sin and, incredibly, sentences himself. God's holiness is honored. Our sin is punished, and we are redeemed. God does what we cannot do so we can be what we dare not dream: perfect before God."

Look up and see his grace, freely offered on the cross and always.
