PERSONAL STUDY

It is rewarding to invest time each day in God's Word.

Mo Rom. 8:31

Start this week off with the confidence that God is on your side. Not because of your strength, intellect, or ability. No, he is on your side because he already gave you new life in Christ. Thank God!

Tu Rom. 8:35

Read this verse and confess to God the things you have worried about and let you feel separated from his love. Declare his power over all these things you've allowed to \make you feel detached from his love.

We Rom. 14:16

The world has a history of calling good bad and bad good. Ask God to show you how this is happening around you. Pray for guidance to challenge the world's bait-n-switch.

Th Col. 4:5-6

Are you frustrated by the fraud, neglect, and deceit around you? Share your frustrations with the Lord. Allow his Spirit to prepare you to redeem the time and interactions you have with those who are blinded.

Fr Proverbs 9:7-9

If our words make a difference, then the cost might feel justified. Hear the meaning of this verse; First, we speak, then they react. You can't know beforehand. Speak with love. Speak your faith.

Sa Rom. 8:31

Praise God for fighting with you. Thank him for giving you victory in the difficult conversations of this week. Ask him to strengthen your spirit of faith to see his power in all situations.

Study & Discuss

- Read Luke 14:15-23.
 - Share how you first heard or received God's invitation.
 - What was your initial response? Why?
 - Share if you ever had a harsh response when you have tried to share God's invitation.
- Read the three key passages from the lesson (Rom. 8:31, 14:16, and Matt. 5:44-47).
 - Do you ever feel as if there is so much against us?
 - Do you struggle to keep the good from being spoken of as evil?
 - Have you ever experienced success in praying for an enemy?
- In the sermon, Matt shared several positive outcomes from believers living out their faith (ex. care for children, hospitals and the Red Cross, abolishing slavery, higher education, etc.).
 - What other positive outcomes can you think of?
 - How does faith help us excel in the face of adversity?
 - Read Pro. 9:7-9. How do you know when you are dealing with a foolish or wise person? How have you determined when to walk away or speak up when faced with a difficult person?
- Does imagining Jesus at the table with you bring some change in your words, action, or thought? If so, what?
